# Ash Wednesday March 5, 2025

### AS WE GATHER

The season of the Church Year that starts with Ash Wednesday is known by differing terms in various nations. The official term that dates back to the sixth century AD is Quadragesima, from the Latin word for "fortieth." This term is carried forward in Latin-based languages such as Spanish (cuaresma) and Italian (Quaresima). Central Europeans reflect the self-denial aspect of the Lenten time using the term Fastenzeit (fasting time) in Germany and Nagy-bost (great fast) in Hungary. That naming tradition is also kept in Arabic-speaking countries, where the term Sawm al-Kabir (big fast) is used. Northern Europeans and related countries refer to the season of the year, relating back to the old Anglo-Saxon word Lengtentide (springtime), which described when the days lengthened light-wise. Although the terms for the forty days of Lent may differ, the spiritual importance of "the forty" remains constant and powerful. May keeping this time of penance and prayer with "sincerity and truth" (1 Corinthians 5:8) lead us to observe a blessed and holy Lent!



- The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit; a broken and contrite heart, O God, You will not despise.


- **O** Do good to Zion in Your good pleasure; build up the walls of Jerusalem;

### CONFESSION AND ABSOLUTION







### HYMN INTRODUCTION

- The season of Lent as a time of prayer, fasting, and repentance has a long history in the Christian Church. All the way back in the year AD 325, a document from the Council of Nicaea set forth a forty-day period leading up to Holy Week and Easter as a time of special devotion. The hymn "O Lord, throughout These Forty Days" recalls the time Jesus went without food in the wilderness prior to His temptation by Satan. Through the words of the hymn, we pray that our observance of a holy Lent would reflect the sacrificial love and determination of our Savior as He carried out God's gracious plan of salvation for us.
- In the text of this hymn for Ash Wednesday was written by American Lutheran hymn writer Gilbert Doan in the twentieth century as a paraphrase of a Lenten hymn for children written by Claudia Hernaman, an English author of more than 150 hymn texts in the previous century. Although it may have initially been directed at young people, its closing stanza serves as a prayer for people of every age, that the Lord would be with us during this time of spiritual observance and sustain us until we come to the joys of the eternal Easter celebration. The tune to which the hymn is now sung is from seventeenth-century Scotland.

### READINGS FROM HOLY SCRIPTURE

### OLD TESTAMENT READING

Genesis 3:1-13, 21

Now the serpent was more crafty than any other beast of the field that the Lord God had made.

He said to the woman, "Did God actually say, 'You shall not eat of any tree in the garden'?" The man said, "The woman whom you gave to be with me, she gave me fruit of the tree, and I ate." Then the Lord God said to the woman, "What is this that you have done?" The woman said, "The serpent deceived me, and I ate."...

On the cross His blood outpoured.


Lamb of God, once slain for sinners,




As the ashes are imposed on the forehead of each person in the sign of the cross, the pastor or vicar says, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return."


