Dear Friends in Christ,

ST PAUL HIGH SCHOOL, MO, CHOIR

We are privileged to host the St Paul Lutheran High School Choir from Concordia, Missouri, on Sunday, March 2 as part of their spring tour. St Paul is the only residential high school in our synod. One of the choir members is MN North District Pres. Brady Finnern's daughter. They will sing during our morning service. They will lead a time of sharing and questions in the fellowship hall. ACT will serve a free pasta bar dinner for everyone at 11:15 AM. They will also present a concert on March 1 at 6:30 PM at Good Shepherd in Alexandria. We will help house the choir Saturday night along with Good Shepherd. If you are interested in housing a couple students, let me know.

LENT

The season of Lent begins on March 5 with Ash Wednesday. We will offer imposition of ashes on Ash Wednesday. Our services will be at 7 PM throughout lent. We will have soup and sandwich suppers at 6 PM each week. The Gospel in Genesis will be our theme as we explore how God gave the Good News from the very beginning. It is the Good News of the cross. We will see various ways that the cross is foreshadowed and foretold in the first book of the Bible.

CONFIRMATION SCHEDULE

During lent we will adjust our confirmation class schedule. 6th grade will meet from 3:30-4:45. 7th & 8th grade will meet from 5:00-6:15. Worship Spaces

In our current Japanese mission, we make use of a wide variety of worship spaces: an individual household room, a re-arranged child-care space, a church-renovated apartment unit, military-based chapel spaces, and on occasion—even in the mountains—space in a rural, traditional, Japanese hot-spring inn.

It was during a recent, once-a-month visit to our communicant members who live three-and-a-half-hours away by train, who made special arrangements to meet at a mountain-village inn owned and operated by an aunt's family.

We arrived, received a gracious welcome from the aunt and the staff lady, found our way to the allocated space, got situated, then arranged things for worship.

A small cross fixed on the outerwall beam, communion vessels and linens centered on a makeshift altar, preacher and hearers in place, and our Divine Service began with the invocation and sign of the cross.

If you look closely, you will notice a sunken fireplace to the right, set in the straw-mat floor, traditionally used for heating and cooking, with an adjustable bamboo-and-iron-rod pothook hanging from the ceiling. A modern flat-screen TV, electronic equipment, a space heater, and electric ceiling lights keep up with the modern times.

Before worship, while traveling to the site on winding mountain roads, we visited a local mountain dam and reservoir. After worship, we refreshed ourselves with a traditional Japanese hot-spring bath at the inn.

How extra-ordinary an experience; how refreshing for both body and soul!

- prayer for the Japanese people who are guided to folk deities, like the "tengu" mask deity of the Kashozan Mirokuji Temple, in order to pray for divine favor, safety, and the fulfillment of wishes;
- thanksgiving for the wonderful variety of Christian worship spaces wherever God's children sanctify those spaces by their gathering for the public ministry of Word and Sacrament which provide true life and salvation;
- thanksgiving for preceding generations of missionaries who have brought saving faith with sound doctrine and practice into native languages and theological texts around the globe;
- thanksgiving for God's blessings at our three current worship sites: Shinjuku (twice a month), Yokosuka (once a month), and Numata (once a month);
- thanksgiving for completion of our latest translation project of Engelbrecht, *The Lutheran Difference* (CPH 2014);
- thanksgiving for our LCMS Asia regional director Rev. Charles Ferry, our area facilitator Rev. Matthew Wood, and our fellow LCMS Asia missionaries each with individual challenges and blessings;
- thanksgiving for the faithful prayers and support provided by our LCMS Jastram-Asia mission partners.

pursuing a particular
project: to compile
a list of Japanese-

language LCMS publications, produced by the previous generation of Japan missionaries.

I dug through a cardboard box of missionary records provided by the family of our longest-serving LCMS missionary in Japan: Rev. George Shibata (in Japan from 1949 to his death in 2002).

What a joy to find his neatly written notebooks, his ring-binders of Tokyo area administration records, and his partial lists of mission publications, both of theological textbooks and of pamphlet-tract materials.

With as many of these previous Japanese-language publications as can be located, we will have to compile a spreadsheet and evaluate whether they are still usable in language and content for our current work in Japan. The literary-and-classical Japanese language still in use at that time does not often appeal to our current Japanese population which is more accustomed to colloquial and contemporary usages. •
